


Tips & Tricks for Using Faileas' Pin Icons

Thanks for trying out my pin icons. They are fairly versatile if you are familiar with how to use custom colors in Wonderdraft. That said, I wasn't familiar with those when I started out so in this document is a brief tutorial on how to make use of that feature, but first, here are some ways you can get more out of the pins:


- Add lettering using the Label feature. I find it works well to create a thin outline around the letter that helps it pop out from the color of the pin.
- Add other symbols. It can be a little tricky to avoid the spot where the pin icon will jump to the top and hide the symbol you are trying to place on it, but it is possible to make it work.



Using Custom Colors

Once you select the Pins symbol set, you will be able to see what the icons will look like based on the custom colors you currently have chosen. The left-hand and center Custom Colors will impact the flags and the ball at the top of the pin. The right-hand color will impact the outline of the icon. I recommend:

- Setting each Custom Color to full opacity so that it isn't see-through. This can be done by clicking on the color and then moving the "A" slider all the way to the right (value = 255).
- Setting the right-hand color to full black.

This controls opacity.
